

Is your household ready?

Essentials! Make sure you have 3 days of water and food supplies!

So that you can go without shopping during heavy rain, be sure to have water and long life food saved up. In the case of a large earthquake, water and food supplies are essential. After a large earthquake, help won't arrive from outside for 3 days, so prepare 3 days worth of supplies.

Water 9 liters x No. of people in household

Each person needs 3 liters of drinking water per day (4 person household= 9 liters x 4 people)



Food Supply It's OK to use what you eat everyday!

Please store food that you can eat without cooking.

- Retort pouches (okayu, zosui, stew, etc.)
- Canned, bottled food



Always keep your fridge and pantry full!

Buy lots of groceries, eat the oldest produce first, and buy more as soon as you use them. Always keep a "new stockpile" in your house.

Have you got it ready yet?

Your emergency bag

Prepare a backpack filled with things that you would need in a power or water outage, or if you need to evacuate quickly. Place the bag near the entrance of your home.

- Batteries
- Handheld radio
- Flashlight
- Emergency toilet
- Whistle (to call for help)



You can find everything you need at 100 shops and home improvement centers!

- Things you might need
 - * A little bit of water and some snacks
 - * Milk powder and diapers for babies
 - * Your regular medicine
 - * Contact lens (or a spare pair of glasses)
 - * Feminine hygiene products
 - * Tissues
 - * Masks



A backpack is best because it leaves your hands free!

Be Fully Prepared for a Typhoon!

In 2018 a series of typhoons and heavy rain caused landslides, power outages, and water outages in areas of Minoh City.

In late June, 2018 during the record heavy rain (the Heavy Rains of July 2018) caused damage in Minoh City such as landslides blocking roads, and blocked gutters flooding entire streets. Then in September, the exceptionally strong Typhoon No. 21 (Typhoon Jebi) struck Minoh. The strong wind caused trees and telephone poles to fall over, and there were widespread power outages. In some apartment buildings, power outages meant that the buildings' water pumps stopped working, causing water outages as well.

No one can tell when typhoons or heavy rain like this will occur again. They can come one after the other, especially between August and October. In order to protect yourself from danger, you must get ready, not sometime soon, but now. Refer to the following points and prepare yourself for a typhoon as soon as possible.

When a typhoon is coming...

Get information from Minoh City!

In typhoons, torrential rain, and other disasters, **Tackey 816 FM 81.6 MHz** will repeatedly broadcast emergency information.

If you haven't registered yet, please do so. If you have already registered, we apologise for the inconvenience and ask that you cancel your registration and sign up again to be able to choose which alerts you would like to receive.

If a serious disaster that may harm citizens occurs, Minoh City will set up an Disaster Response Headquarters, where urgent information will be broadcast through Tackey 816 (FM 81.6 MHz). Please always bring a portable radio with you in times of disaster. Some smartphones may be able to tune in.

※Information is broadcast periodically in English.

City news on evacuation centers, etc. is broadcast through...

Tackey 816 (FM 81.6 MHz), the City's Safety Alert LINE, Email and Twitter, the City website emergency information, and the public address system (located in parks, etc.).

The public address speaker system broadcast is one method used to communicate information in the event of a disaster. You cannot hear it inside buildings. Also, you may be unable to hear it depending on the situation you are in (if there is strong wind or rain for instance.) Please tune into **Tackey 816 (FM 81.6 MHz)**.


Use the following checklist to prepare for a typhoon as soon as you can!

Are there leaves or garbage stuck in the gutters around your house?

Having leaves, branches, or garbage stuck in your gutter causes water to overflow. A blockage in one place causes the whole surrounding area to flood, so it will not only cause damage around your home, but your entire neighborhood.

This year the citywide "Clean Minoh Strategy" where everyone cleans the city at the same time together has been cancelled. Due to this there is a high chance that garbage and etc. will block the gutters around the city.

Once the rain starts to fall it is already too late to do anything. Make sure to check the gutters around your house and keep them free from leaves, branches, garbage, and anything else that might block them.



When a typhoon is approaching...

Take preventative measures before the wind and rain get strong!

- ☑ Bring inside anything that might fly away in strong winds

- Potted plants and hanging planters
- Laundry hangers
- Laundry pole
- Cleaning equipment, such as brooms
- Bamboo screens, etc.



- ☑ Close your storm shutters, window shutters and curtains early

Before the wind and rain get strong, close your window shutters and lock them. If you don't have any shutters, close your curtains so that if the wind blows something into the window they protect you from any flying broken glass. Stick safety film to your windows for extra protection.

Should you go to the evacuation center or stay home?

Check the Hazard Zone Map to know which is safer for your household!

Make sure to check that you have the latest version!

In a typhoon or heavy rain, the most dangerous place to be is outdoors in a hazard zone*. If you live in a hazard zone, but your house is safe, it is actually more dangerous to go outside during the storm.

Check the Hazard Zone Map that was handed out with the May 2019 issue of Momiji Dayori, and find out if it is safer for you to evacuate or take refuge at home in an emergency. If you do not have a Hazard Zone Map you can collect one from the City Office's main building 1F counters and from the Toyokawa and Todoromi Branch Offices or check the City website.

*A hazard zone is an area where there is a chance of landslides and/or flooding.

*To prevent the spread of Covid-19 (coronavirus), measures such as ensuring that there is a lot of space etc. will be taken when opening evacuation centers. Please look into the possibility of taking refuge at the houses of relatives and friends who live outside of a hazard zone.

Do not go outside! Danger!

It is extremely dangerous to check on rice fields, water channels, reservoirs, etc. during a typhoon or heavy rain!

In the news, you often hear about elderly people who go missing in typhoons and heavy rains. Most of these cases are due to these people going outside to check on their rice fields, water channels, reservoirs, and other places used in farming. Every year across the country there are instances of elderly people dying from falling when clearing water channels etc. in heavy rain. Even if you think you will be fine, you must not go outside in a typhoon or heavy rain. If there is someone with you who is trying to go outside no matter what, join together with others to stop them from leaving. If for some reason you are in a situation when you absolutely must go outside to check something, go together in a group with other people.
