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Be prepared for future disasters

At 4:10 p.m. on 1 January this year, the Noto Peninsula Earthquake struck from its epicenter in the Noto region of Ishikawa prefecture. This caused intensity level (shindo) 7 shaking across surrounding areas, the highest level on the scale. We don't know when another large earthquake like this will strike again. It is important to think about what to do if a disaster strikes, so that you can take appropriate action wherever you are without panicking.



If an earthquake strikes when... (e.g. you are working) When disaster strikes, the actions you should take change depending on when and where you are 6:00 a.m. Wake up Breakfast < I turned off the stove! What do I do next?! Earthquake strikes The Great Fast Japan 9:00 a.m. Take kids to school We're halfway to daycare... Should we turn back or keep going? Earthquake struck at 2:46 p.m. in the daytime... Go to work Your family is separated Travel for work The train suddenly stopped! People are injured inside! Public transport stops, getting home is difficult
Fires could break out in kitchens 12:00 p.m. Lunch The shop is on fire! Where should I escape to? Less people to help in rural areas 3:00 p.m. Serve customers The customers are panicking! How should I guide them? Earthquake strikes The Great Hanshin-Awaji 6:00 p.m. Pick up kids — The train stopped and I can't get home! I'm worried about my kids... in the nighttime... Earthquake struck at 5:46 a.m. Most people are home Dinner -There's a blackout and we can't see anything! Where is the flashlight? People get trapped in collapsed houses and under furniture 9:00 p.m. Sleep You need a light to be able to see

Think about what will happen and what you will need in a disaster, and make sure you are always ready.

Lack of light delays rescue efforts

It takes time for help to arrive directly after a disaster prepare 3 days of water and food supplies Water and power outages put everything you need into an emergency bag, etc.
